our why: plan and process

The Lincoln Library staff is proud to present our community with a new strategic plan. This five-year plan will be in effect from June 2018 through February 2023.

Strategic Purpose

The purpose of this plan is to guide the library at all levels of decision-making in an organized and strategic way to ensure we are all working collaboratively toward common goals. This plan outlines our values and vision, which will not only be helpful in terms of high-level planning, but will also guide our staff in day-to-day activities.

While this plan is a deliberate approach to serving the citizens of the Springfield area, it also recognizes the dynamic times in which we live. With that in mind, the strategic planning committee will meet on an annual basis to review the plan in order to ensure its relevance, create specific measurable goals for that year, and monitor its impact on our community. It should be a **living document** – something we constantly keep in mind and continue to author as time goes on.

Planning Process

Our strategic planning process started in March 2015. A small group of library staff, board members, and community representatives came together to begin the strategic planning process, guided by the American Library Association text, *Strategic Planning for Results* by Sandra Nelson. In order to create a plan that reflected the community's needs and wants, a survey gathered feedback from 92 community members through the library's website. The committee also consulted with The University of Illinois at Springfield to contact a diverse group of 39 community stakeholders, with 11 respondents. The feedback from these surveys laid the groundwork for this plan. The committee suggested nine service responses and presented them to library staff, who weighed their potential effectiveness and relevance, ultimately selecting four of them. These service responses have become the strategic goals the library staff will use to fulfill identified community needs. In February 2017, the committee created our mission statement: "Empower. Connect. Inspire." This statement was approved by the Lincoln Library Board of Trustees in August 2017.

In September 2017, the committee shared the mission statement and strategic goals with Lincoln Library staff, and invited them to contribute ideas and activities that correlate with those goals. The response was overwhelmingly positive, generating over seven pages of ideas. Many of these ideas have been incorporated into the final strategic plan, which was approved by the Board in 2018.



Potential Objective: Create, maintain, and promote a Parent and Educator Resource Collection during 2018.








Hours and Location

Our library consists of a single physical location in downtown Springfield, Illinois, at 326 S. 7th Street. Our current hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Thursday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Sunday (October-April) from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Our library website domain is **www.lincolnlibrary.info**, and it is available to cardholders and the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

Sangamon Valley Collection

Lincoln Library is also home to the Sangamon Valley Collection. The SVC, located on the third floor, provides in-depth resources for the study of Springfield, Illinois, Sangamon County, and the eleven adjacent counties. The collection, established in 1970, contains materials from the past and present. The Sangamon Valley Collection is a non-circulating collection. The SVC is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. (til 8 p.m. on Wednesday), and from 1 – 5 p.m. on Sunday when the library is open (October-April).

our library: patrons and programs






Our collection includes both digital and physical materials. The charts on this page reflect the composition of our collection during FY18.






our library: circulation of materials

Note: The committee has identified objectives based on our strategic goals to give us a shared point of reference for our work together in fiscal year 2019.

Support Young Minds

- Create and maintain a Parent and Educator Resource Collection.
- Host 6 programs involving technology for children and teenagers.
- Offer 4 total special events for middle and high school students.
- Increase ease-of-use by creating 5 new collections and 7 topic areas within youth services.

Create Informed Citizens

- Provide 4 classes a year on how to evaluate credible and reliable information with program attendance of at least 40 people total.
- Create and host 4 programs a year to engage new residents and connect them to local resources and government.
- Provide 10 programs or displays promoting civic engagement.

Embrace Diversity

- Dedicate 25% of staff training hours to diversity topics.
- Collaborate with 10 diverse organizations within Springfield.
- Host an annual intercultural festival to celebrate and embrace the community's diversity with at least 300 attendees.
- Increase usage of foreign language resources, both print and digital, by 10%.
- Create 6 displays or programs that highlight diverse groups throughout the year, in conjunction with awareness dates.

Encourage Curiosity

- Provide access to 10 free fine arts experiences for all ages.
- Provide 4 off-site programs with a total target attendance of 50 people.
- Host 8 physical and health education programs for all ages, levels and abilities.
- Increase the number of Lynda.com users by 5%.
- Expand collections of non-traditional items.

Global Objectives

- Create 20 library-related posts per social media platform per month.
- Increase Facebook engagement by 15%.
- Increase staff training to 500 hours.
- Conduct 50 outreach events.
- Increase the number of active library accounts by 5%.
